"The Women Who Saved Rosedale"

Throughout its 200+ year history, Rosedale has been home to many notable women. Through their contributions, Rosedale's legacy was maintained and, in many ways, saved from being lost altogether. Sarah Frew Davidson, whose money saved the home from foreclosure; to Cherry, the enslaved house servant who took care of Rosedale's resident children following the untimely death of their mother. Then from Harriet Caldwell; to Mary Louise and Alice Davidson, the home's last residents, and the Mecklenberg Committee of the Colonial Dames of America who purchased the property and raised the funds towards its preservation and restoration, it was the women of Rosedale who played a substantial part in saving the home and its history.

In honor of Women's History Month, Rosedale is proud to share the stories of these and many other of our site's remarkable women in our current exhibit "To the Rescue: The Women Who Saved Rosedale." Sarah Frew Davidson (1772-1812) was the sister of Archibald Frew, Rosedale's first resident owner, and came to Charlotte with her brother when they were orphaned in the late 1790s. While Sarah never lived at Rosedale, she figures prominently in its history. Sarah first married Thomas Davidson, a prominent planter in Mecklenburg County, and after his passing married his nephew William Davidson, who was later named a North Carolina State Senator. Having had to give over all her property to her first husband when they wed, (which was surprisingly substantial for a young woman of her time), Sarah had the foresight to implement an agreement with her second husband before their marriage, making certain her money remained hers in the event of his death. Family tradition states that it was in fact her money that saved Rosedale from foreclosure when Archibald went bankrupt in 1816. Sarah and William established their own home (The Grove) in N. Mecklenburg County, where they had five children, one of whom was Harriet Davidson Caldwell who later came to live at Rosedale in 1826 with her husband, Dr. David Thomas Caldwell.

He is also a member of Rosedale's AAL Committee and designed the African American Memorial with assistance from Rosedale, related cousins Tawana Allen, Tamia Williams and AAL committee members Elizabeth Myers and Ronald Schumann.

Historic Rosedale has initiated a search for a new Executive Director, with the valuable support of board member, Shannon Curtis, and board members Barbara Taylor, Tom Spada, Anne Moore and Martin Foil, Volunteer Blacksmith. We have advertised with the NC Museums Council, the Arts and Science Council and the SE Museums Council. Several promising applications have been received and we are looking forward to having this position filled very soon.

Additionally, we have completed the major repairs to the house. We still have the back porch and main bedroom entrance to complete, **but we have run out of funds.** The dormers, chimney caps, front entrance, porches, west side entrance doors and siding, window sills, frames and shutters have all been repaired and painted. So far this phase has taken 18 months! Once the above repairs are complete, we will need funding for Phase II, CLEAN AND PAINT THE HOUSE!
